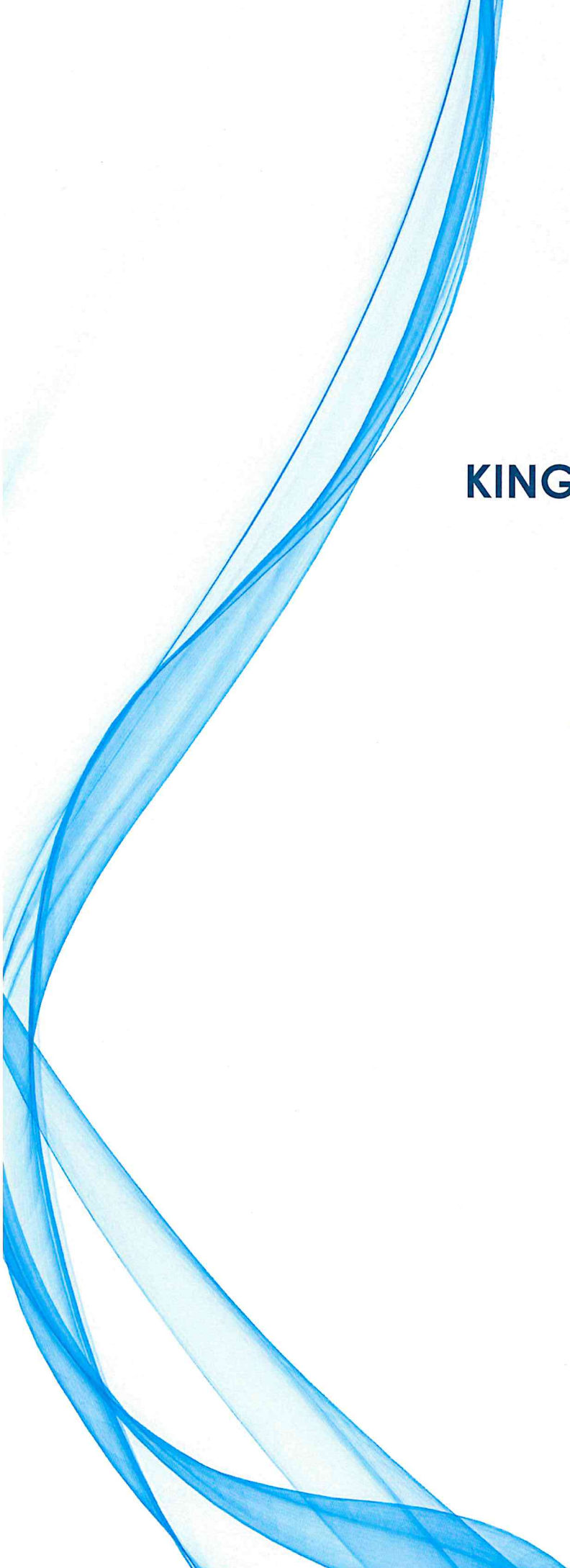

Report of the auditor-general to the Eastern Cape Provincial Legislature and the council of King Sabata Dalindyebo Local Municipality

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

1. I have audited the financial statements of King Sabata Dalindyebo Local Municipality set out on pages xx to xx, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, statement financial performance, statement of changes in net assets, the cash flow statement and the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended, as well as notes to the financial statements including a summary of significant accounting policies.
2. In my opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of King Sabata Dalindyebo Local Municipality as at 30 June 2025 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the South African Standard of Generally Recognised Accounting Practice (GRAP), and the requirements of the Municipal Finance Management Act 56 of 2003 (MFMA) and the Division of Revenue Act 24 of 2024 (Dora).

Basis for opinion

3. I conducted my audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the responsibilities of the auditor-general for the audit of the financial statements section of my report.
4. I am independent of the municipality in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' *International Code of ethics for Professional Accountants (including International Independence Standards)* (IESBA code) as well as other ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit in South Africa. I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA code.
5. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Material uncertainty related to going concern

6. I draw attention to the matters below. My opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.
7. I draw attention to note 64 to the financial statements, which indicates that the municipality is taking 172 days to pay creditors and 141 days to collect its outstanding debt. These events and conditions disclosed in note 64 to the financial statements together with other matters set forth in the same note, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the municipalities ability to continue as a going concern.

Emphasis of matters

8. I draw attention to the matters below. My opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.
9. As disclosed in note 57 to the financial statements, material electricity distribution losses of R113,52 million (2023-24: R120,92 million) were incurred, which represents 13,57% (2023-24: 15,02%) of total electricity purchased. The losses are due to amongst others defective meters, electric faults and meter tempering.
10. As disclosed in note 52 to the financial statements, the municipality is the defendant in several lawsuits. The municipality is opposing the claims, and the ultimate outcome of the matters could not be determined as yet.
11. As disclosed in notes 4 and 5 to the financial statements, cumulative debt impairments of R509,24 million (2023-24: R482,52 million) and R304,35 million (2023-24: R296,39 million) were made to receivables from exchange and non-exchange transactions respectively.
12. As disclosed in note 41 to the financial statements, material losses of R32,45 million (2023-24: R21,72 million) were incurred as a result of a write-off of irrecoverable trade debtors.
13. As disclosed in note 63 to the financial statements, the corresponding figures for 30 June 2024 were restated as a result of errors in the financial statements of the municipality at, and for the year ended, 30 June 2025.

Responsibilities of the accounting officer for the financial statements

14. The accounting officer is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the GRAP, the requirements of the MFMA and DORA; and for such internal control as the accounting officer determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
15. In preparing the financial statements, the accounting officer is responsible for assessing the municipality's ability to continue as a going concern; disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern; and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the appropriate governance structure either intends to liquidate the municipality or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Responsibilities of the auditor-general for the audit of the financial statements

16. My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

17. A further description of my responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements is included in the annexure to this auditor's report. This description, which is located at page xx forms part of my auditor's report.

Report on the audit of the annual performance report

18. In accordance with the Public Audit Act 25 of 2004 (PAA) and the general notice issued in terms thereof, I must audit and report on the usefulness and reliability of the reported performance against predetermined objectives for the selected development priority presented in the annual performance report. The accounting officer is responsible for the preparation of the annual performance report.
19. I selected the following development priority presented in the annual performance report for the year ended 30 June 2025 for auditing. I selected a development priority that measures the municipality's performance on its primary mandated functions and that is of significant national, community or public interest.

20. I evaluated the reported performance information for the selected development priority against the criteria developed from the performance management and reporting framework, as defined in the general notice. When an annual performance report is prepared using these criteria, it provides useful and reliable information and insights to users on the municipality's planning and delivery on its mandate and objectives.
21. I performed procedures to test whether:
- the indicators used for planning and reporting on performance can be linked directly to the municipality's mandate and the achievement of its planned objectives.
 - all the indicators relevant for measuring the municipality's performance against its primary mandated and prioritised functions and planned objectives are included.
 - the indicators are well defined to ensure that they are easy to understand and can be applied consistently, as well as verifiable so that I can confirm the methods and processes to be used for measuring achievements.
 - the targets can be linked directly to the achievement of the indicators and are specific, time bound and measurable to ensure that it is easy to understand what should be delivered and by when, the required level of performance as well as how performance will be evaluated.
 - the indicators and targets reported on in the annual performance report are the same as those committed to in the approved initial or revised planning documents.

- the reported performance information is presented in the annual performance report in the prescribed manner and is comparable and understandable.
- there is adequate supporting evidence for the achievements reported and for the reasons provided for any over or underachievement of targets/measures taken to improve performance.

22. I performed the procedures for the purpose of reporting material findings only; and not to express an assurance opinion or conclusion.

Basic service delivery and infrastructure development

Missing indicator for provision of free basic services to indigent customers

23. In terms of the Municipal Systems Act, the municipality is responsible for providing all members of the local community access to at least the minimum level of basic municipal services. However, an indicator to measure performance on this responsibility was omitted from the approved planning documents. The accounting officer indicated that the indicator "number of quarterly reports on implementation of the Indigent Policy by June 2025" was considered sufficient to report on service delivery. However, this could not be verified, as users of the annual report do not have access to the underlying quarterly reports. Consequently, the achievement of this legislative mandate was not planned or accounted for, which is likely to result in it not being delivered efficiently and undermines transparency and accountability for delivery on mandate.

Other matters

24. I draw attention to the matters below.

Achievement of planned targets

25. The annual performance report includes information on reported achievements against planned targets and provides measures taken to improve performance.

26. The table that follows provides information on the achievement of planned targets and lists the key service delivery indicators that were not achieved as reported in the annual performance report. The reasons for any underachievement of targets/measures taken to improve performance are included in the annual performance report on pages xx to xx.

Report on compliance with legislation

27. In accordance with the PAA and the general notice issued in terms thereof, I must audit and report on compliance with applicable legislation relating to financial matters, financial management and other related matters. The accounting officer is responsible for the municipality's compliance with legislation.
28. I performed procedures to test compliance with selected requirements in key legislation in accordance with the findings engagement methodology of the Auditor-General of South Africa (AGSA). This engagement is not an assurance engagement. Accordingly, I do not express an assurance opinion or conclusion.
29. Through an established AGSA process, I selected requirements in key legislation for compliance testing that are relevant to the financial and performance management of the municipality, clear to allow consistent measurement and evaluation, while also sufficiently detailed and readily available to report in an understandable manner. The selected legislative requirements are included in the annexure to this auditor's report.
30. The material findings on compliance with the selected legislative requirements, presented per compliance theme, are as follows:

Annual financial statements, annual performance report and annual report

31. The financial statements submitted for auditing were not prepared in all material respects in accordance with the requirements of section 122(1) of the MFMA. Material misstatements of non-current assets, current assets, expenditure and disclosure items were identified by the auditors in the submitted financial statement were subsequently corrected, resulting in the financial statements receiving an unqualified audit opinion.

Expenditure management

32. Reasonable steps were not taken to ensure that money owed by the municipality was always paid within 30 days, as required by section 65(2)(e) of the MFMA.
33. Reasonable steps were not taken to prevent fruitless and wasteful expenditure amounting to R36,58 million, as disclosed in note 55 to the annual financial statements, in contravention of section 62(1)(d) of the MFMA. The majority of the disclosed fruitless and wasteful expenditure was caused by interest and penalties charged on late payments.
34. Reasonable steps were not taken to prevent unauthorised expenditure amounting to R86,49 million, as disclosed in note 54 to the annual financial statements, in contravention of section 62(1)(d) of the MFMA. The majority of the unauthorised expenditure was caused by overspending on the debtors written off.

Other information in the annual report

35. The accounting officer is responsible for the other information included in the annual report. The other information does not include the financial statements, the auditor's report and those selected development priorities presented in the annual performance report that have been specifically reported on in this auditor's report.
36. My opinion on the financial statements, and my reports on the audit of the annual performance report and compliance with legislation do not cover the other information included in the annual report and I do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion on it.
37. My responsibility is to read this other information and, in doing so, consider whether it is materially inconsistent with the financial statements and the selected development priorities presented in the annual performance report or my knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.
38. If, based on the work I have performed on the other information that I obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

Internal control deficiencies

39. I considered internal control relevant to my audit of the financial statements, annual performance report and compliance with applicable legislation; however, my objective was not to express any form of assurance on it.
40. The matters reported below are limited to the significant internal control deficiencies that resulted in the material findings on the annual performance report and the material findings on compliance with legislation included in this report.
41. The accounting officer did not ensure that an effective performance management system and related controls were in place, as a legislated function was omitted from the planning

document. This weakness limited adequate monitoring, measurement and reporting of performance.

42. Internal controls were not adequately designed to ensure that payments to suppliers were made timeously due to cash flow problems, which resulted in fruitless and wasteful expenditure. Furthermore, expenditure was not effectively managed within the approved budget, leading to non-compliance with applicable legislation.
43. Although reviews of the financial statements were performed, material misstatements were identified. The reviews conducted during the year were not effective in detecting the misstatements. Furthermore, management did not adhere to the GRAP and approved municipal policies, which contributed to the identified material misstatements.

Other reports

44. I draw attention to the following engagements conducted by various parties. These reports did not form part of my opinion on the financial statements or my findings on the reported performance information or compliance with legislation.
45. The Special Investigation Unit was investigating matters that arose in previous years, including the costs incurred for the funeral of former president Nelson Mandela. This investigation is still in progress.
46. An independent consultant conducted a forensic investigation into grievances raised by staff members, which extends to an assessment of skills and knowledge and task grade payments made to staff in the previous financial cycles. This report has been completed and is awaiting council deliberation on how to implement the recommendations.
47. A provincial department is investigating alleged fraud at the motor vehicle licensing centre from the previous financial year. The investigation was completed, and the matter was heard in court on 26 March 2025. All accused were found not guilty of the charges brought against them.

Auditor general's responsibility for the audit

Professional judgement and professional scepticism

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout my audit of the financial statements and the procedures performed on reported performance information for selected development priorities and on the municipality's compliance with selected requirements in key legislation.

Financial statements

In addition to my responsibility for the audit of the financial statements as described in this auditor's report, I also:

- identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error; design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks; and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations or the override of internal control.
- obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the municipality's internal control.
- evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made.
- conclude on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements. I also conclude, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists relating to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the municipality to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements about the material uncertainty or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion on the financial. My conclusions are based on the information available to me at the date of this auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the municipality to cease operating as a going concern.
- evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and determine whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

Communication with those charged with governance

I communicate with the accounting officer regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

I also provide the accounting officer with a statement that I have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence and communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on my independence and, where applicable, actions taken to eliminate threats or safeguards applied.
